Why the Need to Codify Preservation

- Preservation not found in law, but memo from FHWA
- Effect on industry
 - Federal funding not available in all areas
 - Uncertainty of funding difficult for planning



Why the Need to Codify Preservation

- Personnel changes could affect interpretation
- Language in statute removes uncertainty
- Statutory clarification needed

- The re-authorization of SAFETEA-LU which was enacted in 2005, set to expire in 2009-provided an opportunity
- THE MISSION: get preservation language inserted in the legislation

- FP² Inc. created in July 2009 from the Foundation for Pavement Preservationamong its many objectives was to recognize pavement preservation in statutory language.
- Develop broad industry coalition to support (FP2) and quell any potential opposition
- Create a solution that simultaneously benefits industry and government

 Broad, continued communication by coalition members to Congress and Administration

Over 130 meetings from October 2009 to
 December 2011

- Met with House and Senate staffers
 directly working on the bill
- Senate bill introduced in late fall 2011 contained our preservation language
- House bill introduced in January 2012
 contained our preservation language

- From January-May great uncertainty about status of the Bill
- Conference Committee formed with House and Senate representatives in early May 2012

Timing

- Senate bill, MAP-21, was used as the vehicle for compromises.
- Conference report issued June 27, 2012
- Bill passed both houses on June 28, 2012
 Strong bi-partisan vote in both Chambers
- Bill signed by the President on July 6, 2012

The Result

- Pavement Preservation language is included in the policy and definition sections of the statute
- Pavement Preservation projects are now eligible to receive federal funds
- Framed the debate for Asset Management
 and Pavement Preservation

Benefits

- Increased federal, state and local funding opportunities
- Longer-term certainty for industry as well as federal, state and local agencies to utilize pavement preservation in their asset management plans and use Federal funding for these activities
- Creates cost savings and flexibility to planning agencies by providing an additional option for transportation infrastructure management

What's Next

- 600 page 27 month reauthorization bill passed in July
- 125 rulemakings statutorily mandated by Congress
- Many other changes to law which Agency
 must analyze....more rulemakings

What's Next

- The Agency is in the process of reviewing and the interpreting the new law.
- FP2 will remain engaged in this process to ensure that outcomes remain at intended.
